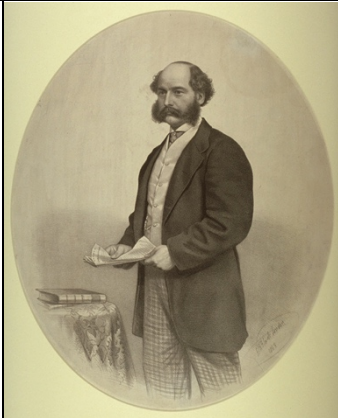
*Ludgate Hill, 1884, Charles John Watson*

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*Sir Joseph W. Bazalgette, 1863, George B. Black*

Chief engineer of London's Metropolitan Board of Works his major achievement was the creation (in response to the Great Stink of 1858) of a sewer network for central London which was instrumental in relieving the city from cholera epidemics, while beginning the cleansing of the River Thames. Here, shown holding papers relating to the Thames Embankment.

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*The Ninth of November, 1888, 1890, William Logsdail*

The Lord Mayor's Procession of Sir James Whitehead, Lord Mayor 1888-1889, passing the Royal Exchange. The crowd show some of the demographics of Victorian London.

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*First London School Board, 1873, John Whitehead Walton*

The first London School Board, established after the 1870 Education act. Women could be elected to the board; Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, and Emilie Davies can be seen in the painting (both campaigners for women's rights).

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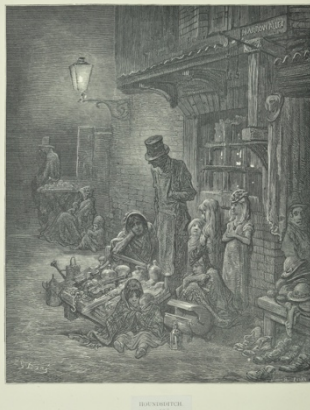
*Young boy selling match sticks, 1884*
